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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Happy New Year! It is sure hard for me to believe that it is 2019 already. Where does time go?

2018 was indeed a busy year for the KPOA Board and all KPOA committees. To review their accomplishments, please visit the KPOA

website's <u>Member's Only</u> page.** There you will find a wealth of information, including minutes for the KPOA Board meetings as well as for the Summer Town Hall Meeting and Winter Annual Meeting. To find a description of all the 2018 committee accomplishments, review the **KPOA Annual Summary 2018**.

On the Horizon for 2019: The Kenmure Security Committee (KSC) will continue to manage our contracts with Allied Universal Services and Maybin, assist with emergencies and ensure that our security rules are enforced, including monitoring traffic and issuing fines when warranted. The Kenmure Architectural Review Committee (KARC) will remain busy monitoring new home construction, approving alterations to existing homes and reviewing requests to remove trees/shrubs. The Kenmure Emergency Management Committee (EMC) remains vigilant to respond in an emergency by training volunteers and reviving the emergency radio system. The Kenmure Road Maintenance Committee (KRMC) will seek bids for scheduled road repaving and continue investigation of an asphalt rejuvenation product; the multi-year project to trim the tree canopy will continue. A big KRMC project for early 2019 is the repair of Chestnut Way. As I write this column, equipment has been mobilized; the plan is for the road to be open to traffic as early as the end of January 2019. A Chestnut Way Update page has been set up on the KPOA website so that you can follow the progress.

Electronic Communications: At the November 2018 KPOA Board meeting, the Board voted that the KPOA Newsletter will be distributed electronically to all KPOA members. As you found out when you received the Kenmure Alert, you can click on a link to open and print your copy. Or, residents can pick up a printed copy at the KPOA Office or the Kenmure Country Club lobby. In addition, all <u>KPOA Newsletters</u> can be found online.

Extraordinary Snow: A big thank you to KRMC and our Snowmen Dave Christenbury and Don Blanton for managing snow removal on KPOA roads during the December 9-10 snow storm. As you know, more than 16 to 18 inches of snow is very unusual for Kenmure! Our Snowmen coordinated the efforts of our snow removal contractor who worked non-stop for 2 days to clear our roads. Most Kenmure roads were passable within 24 hours of the end of the storm. We heard from many of you that you wanted private contractors admitted to Kenmure earlier so that they could begin (Continued next page)

clearing driveways. Rest assured that KRMC and the Board will consider all suggestions as it reviews this storm in order to improve future storm response. We know that the snow storm was an inconvenience for everyone and we thank you for your patience.

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Snowman Job Posting for 2019 – 2020 Season

Dave Christenbury will be ending his tenure as one of two snowmen when the 2018-

2019 snow season is behind us. As such we are opening the role to applicants inside as well as outside of the current Road Maintenance Committee members.

Term of duty:

Ideally the candidate would be willing to do the role for a two-year period so that we can maintain some continuity by having one of our two snowmen always having a year of experience under their belts.

Qualifications:

- Ideal candidate will have had at least one job prior to applying for this important role; however, this is not a must.
- 2) Ideal candidate will be willing to work long hours in collaboration with other members of Road Maintenance and our plowing contractor over "short" one to three-day periods. These events generally occur with a few days advance notice; however, events can pop up with little warning.
- 3) Ideal candidate must have a very positive disposition and possess the unique ability to interpret the occasional sharp criticism from fellow residents as positive, constructive and supportive input.
- 4) Ideal candidate should own or have access to an all-wheel drive vehicle and at least one snow shovel; however, the AWD vehicle is not a must and KPOA will purchase a snow shovel for a qualified candidate.
- 5) Candidate should be based in Kenmure for the winter months as this is a tough job to do from Florida or Arizona.

Salary and Benefits:

- 1) This position has a hazardous duty premium of 50% over the standard KPOA RMC volunteer salary for the months of December to March. This premium increases to 100% for months with snow events totaling 4 or more days. For reference the current base salary of our RMC team members is \$0.00 per annum.
- 2) If the candidate is over 65, he/she will also qualify for Healthcare benefits (Medicare).

RADAR SPEED DETECTOR UPDATE: Kenmure Drive, Overlook Drive, and General Observations

By John Haines and Gene Holland, Security Committee, December 24, 2018 Our radar speed detector was placed in operation on Kenmure Drive around mid-

August 2018. The detector was installed to help raise awareness of our driving speeds in Kenmure and to hopefully influence behavior by encouraging drivers to obey the speed limit. The sign remained at the Kenmure drive location for about six weeks before being moved to a location on Overlook Drive. After 2 months on Overlook Drive the sign was moved to its current position on Tarnhill Drive. Traffic and speed data have been collected and analyzed at the Kenmure and Overlook sites. Data from Tarnhill will be collected in sixweek intervals, but none is available at this time.

DATA FROM KENMURE DRIVE

MID-AUGUST TO OCTOBER 31: For a typical weekday the volume of inbound traffic on Kenmure Drive was between 1300 and 1400 vehicles and between 800 and 1000 on the weekend days. The data also indicated that in an average week approximately 50% of vehicles recorded were at or below the 25 MPH, but 15% were above 29 MPH. The detector software also records the number of vehicles in each 5 MPH increment (e.g. 20-25 MPH) captured on a daily basis. During the 41 days at the Kenmure location over 3,300 vehicles had recorded speeds above 30 MPH; 18 of those had speeds recorded in the two brackets between 40 to 50 MPH. (NOTE: Speed recorded is the highest speed attained for that vehicle. Also, these high speeds were attained in the short distance between the entrance gate and the speed detector.)

DATA FROM OVERLOOK DRIVE

OCTOBER: The speed detector was positioned on Overlook Drive on or about October 1 recording outbound traffic. The following data was obtained for the month on October 31. For a typical target week an average of about 350 vehicles/weekday passed the detector; that number declined to approximately 225 vehicles on weekend days. The average hourly volume between the hours of 8AM and 2 PM was between 30 to 35 vehicles. For a typical week the average speed for each hour between the hours of 4 AM and 7 PM was about 22.5 MPH and the 85th percentile speed* was approximately 28 MPH for the same time period. Compared to Kenmure site data these speeds were 1 to 2 MPH slower.

* The **85th Percentile Speed** is the **speed** that 85 percent of vehicles do not exceed. Another way of looking at this is that only 15 percent of vehicles go faster than this **speed**, and 85 percent go at or below this **speed**.

It was reported by some residents on an adjacent street that traffic volume on their street was heavier because a number of drivers who normally use Overlook were avoiding the speed detector. The October data does not indicate a significant change in volume during the month to support this claim, but it is not clear enough to dispute it.

NOVEMBER: In general, it was difficult to compare November and October data. Of note though the volume of outbound traffic was down in November and less consistent between weekdays compared to October data. Much of this seems to be related to the week preceding and the week of the Thanksgiving holiday. The detector was rotated November 1 to record inbound traffic, but data was so erratic for unknown reasons over 3-4 days it was repositioned to record outbound traffic. For the month, the average speed of all vehicles was around 23-24 MPH during peak usage hours and around 27+/-MPH for the 85th percentile.

The data is very similar and consistent for the two months regarding average and 85th percentile speeds. However, in November only 2.0% of the traffic exceeded 30 MPH versus 2.7% (of a much higher volume) in October. Further, 34 vehicles in October and 6 vehicles in November exceeded 35 MPH. Whether this represents a change in behavior or is attributable to the lower volume and different mix of drivers between the two months cannot be determined.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

Based on several months of data from the two locations, the following general observations can be made.

- Many vehicles slow down when approaching the radar sign even when they are not speeding. This is based on observing traffic behavior and not on the radar data.
- Responses from the majority of residents following the data published for Kenmure Drive was positive. Many residents noted that the speed detector actually helped them to be more aware of their speed.
- One month of data from a location does not provide sufficient data to draw meaningful conclusions as indicated by the monthly comparisons for Overlook Drive.
- 4) The radar speed detector appears to be raising awareness, but it is uncertain as to whether it is changing behavior.
- 5) The Kenmure Drive location appears to be the most effective because it impacts the most vehicles.
- 6) Although the Overlook Drive data indicates slightly lower average speeds than those recorded on Kenmure Drive, the density of residences, with people walking and backing out of driveways, makes the speeds there of more concern.
